BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, with respect to the above-referenced statute, the Chappaqua Central School district asks, by resolution of its governing body, that the Mandate Relief Council reduce the mileage limits for private school out-of-district transportation from 15 miles to 5 miles, which would result in annual savings of approximately \$1.05 Million, thereby offsetting the loss of revenue from consistent yearly reductions of state aid to public schools for transportation costs, and, as noted by the Lower Hudson Council of School Superintendents Recommendations for Mandate Relief dated December 2011, thereby alleviating the burden on our public schools of subsidizing private school transportation that is excessive and that financially benefits private school investors, trustees, and parents who have chosen these as alternatives to their local public school.

FIRST READING (DASA) 5/1/12

HARASSMENT AND DISCRIMINATION PREVENTION AND INTERVENTION

The Board of Education is committed to providing a safe and positive teaching and learning environment. The Board recognizes that students' ability to learn and to meet high academic standards, and a school's ability to educate its students, are compromised by incidents of harassment or discrimination. The Board, therefore, condemns and strictly prohibits all forms of harassment and discrimination on school grounds, school buses and at all school-sponsored activities, programs and events, whether on or off school grounds. Behaviors that take place at locations outside the district that materially and substantially disrupt the educational process of the school environment or impinge on the rights of other students are prohibited, and may be subject to disciplinary consequences.

Definition of Harassment and Discrimination

For purposes of this policy, the term harassment shall mean the creation of a hostile environment by conduct, verbal threats, intimidation or abuse that has or would have the effect of unreasonably and substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities or benefits, or mental, emotional or physical well-being; or conduct, verbal threats, intimidation or abuse that reasonably causes or would reasonably be expected to cause a student to fear for his or her physical safety, or to cause or reasonably be expected to cause damage or loss to a student's property. Such conduct, verbal threats, intimidation or abuse shall include bullying behavior in the form of taunting or intimidation that is intentional and repeated in nature and has or would have the effect of interfering with a student's ability to attend school and/or to be educated in a safe, non-hostile environment.

The creation of such hostile environment includes, but is not limited to, all above-described conduct, verbal threats, intimidation or abuse that occurs through the use of technology, such as email messages, instant messages, text messages, blogs, chat rooms, social networking, pagers, cell phones, and gaming systems, including the posting or forwarding of sexually suggestive nude or nearly nude photos through such technology, and has or would have the effect of interfering with a student's ability to attend school and/or to be educated in a safe, non-hostile environment.

For purposes of this policy, the term discrimination shall mean harassment based on a person's actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender (identity and expression) and sex.

Harassment and Discrimination Prevention Coordinator

The Board shall designate at its annual organizational meeting, a Harassment and Discrimination Prevention Coordinator who shall be trained in accordance with state requirements to successfully implement this policy. Such training shall include human

relations in the areas of race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender (identity and expression) and sex.

The Harassment and Discrimination Prevention Coordinator shall be responsible for coordinating and enforcing this policy and regulations in each school building, including but not limited to coordinating:

- The work of the building-level committees;
- Professional development for staff members;
- The complaint process; and
- Management of the Dignity for All Students Act's civility curriculum components.

Training

In order to implement an effective harassment and discrimination prevention and intervention program, the Superintendent, the Harassment and Discrimination Prevention Coordinator and the district Professional Development Team shall incorporate appropriate and required training in the annual professional development plan. Training opportunities will be provided for all staff, including but not limited to bus drivers, cafeteria and hall monitors and all staff who have contact with students. The Superintendent shall ensure that at least one staff member is thoroughly trained in human relations in the areas of race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender and sex.

Through district-wide professional development and instruction, staff and students will be educated as to the warning signs of harassment and discrimination, as well as to their responsibility to become actively involved in the prevention of harassment and discrimination. The components of a prevention program include:

- Learning about and identifying the early warning signs and precursor behaviors that may lead to harassment and discrimination.
- Establishing clear school wide and classroom rules about harassment and discrimination.
- Training adults in the school to prevent and respond sensitively and consistently to harassment and discrimination.
- Raising parental awareness and involvement in addressing problems.
- Providing instruction in civility, citizenship and character education that emphasizes tolerance and respect for others.

Reporting and Investigation

In order for the district to appropriately address harassment and discrimination in the schools, it is of utmost importance that <u>staff and students report incidents of harassment and discrimination</u>. Students who have been <u>subjected to harassment, bullying behavior or discrimination</u>, parents <u>of those students</u>, or other students who observe <u>such behavior are encouraged</u> and expected to make a verbal and/or written complaint to any school personnel in accordance with the training and guidelines provided. All complaints will be documented, tracked and handled in accordance with the regulations and procedures

accompanying this policy and other applicable district policy (Equal Opportunity and Nondiscrimination or Sexual Harassment or Code of Conduct) and laws.

There shall be a duty for all school personnel to report any incidents of student-to-student and staff-to-student harassment and discrimination that they observe, or of which they are made aware, to their building principal or other administrator who supervises their employment. Supervisors will refer the information to appropriate district staff for investigation, as designated in regulations.

The results of an investigation will be reported both to the target and the accused in accordance with the regulations. If either of the parties disagrees with the results of the investigation, they can appeal the findings in accordance with regulations.

Disciplinary Consequences/Remediation

While the focus of this policy is on prevention, harassment and discrimination acts may still occur. In these cases, offenders will be given the clear message that their actions are wrong and the behavior must improve. Offenders will receive in-school guidance in making positive choices in their relationships with others. If appropriate, disciplinary action will be taken by the administration in accordance with the district's Code of Conduct, as applicable. If the behavior rises to the level of criminal activity, law enforcement will be contacted. Consequences for committing an act or acts of harassment and discrimination shall be determined on a case-by-case basis in accordance with the district Code of Conduct. The consequences will vary in method and severity according to the nature of the behavior, the developmental age of the student, and the student's history of problem behaviors.

Non-Retaliation

All complainants and those who participate in the <u>initiation or</u> investigation of a complaint in conformity with state law and district policies, who have acted reasonably and in good faith, have the right to be free from retaliation of any kind.

Dissemination, Monitoring, Review and Reporting

This policy, or a plain language summary, shall be published in student registration materials, student, parent and employee handbooks, and posted on the district's website. A harassment and discrimination complaint form will be developed and will be available on the district's website.

Each year, as part of the annual review of the Code of Conduct, this policy will be reviewed to assess its effectiveness and compliance with state and federal law. If changes are needed, revisions will be recommended to the Board for its consideration.

The Superintendent of Schools shall establish regulations to facilitate implementation of this policy.

Special Education - Dr. Heidi McCarthy, Director

Dr. McCarthy reviewed some of the many laws and regulations governing special education students to determine eligibility, the classifications, and recommended programs.

Dr. McCarthy reviewed the make up of the committees and their responsibilities to review evaluations, reports, other data and identify strengths and needs using the 13 classification categories. She went over the statistics and services that are provided to both preschool and regular classes. Classification rates are below state and other school districts. She outlined the in district and out of district programs.

Dr. McCarthy presented the main components of her budget:: staffing, contract services, tuition for students in out-of-district placements and transportation. She noted the reduction in staffing this year: a .6 FTE psychologist at the elementary level; 1 FTE special education teacher; 4.5 FTE

teaching assistant positions. A .4 psychologist position will conduct all evaluations for elementary school.

She explained the line by line of her proposed budget with an increase of 4.07%, and pupil transportation 8.51%.

<u>Technology</u> - <u>Darleen Nicolosi</u>, <u>Director of Technology</u>

The technology budget is composed of three components, instructional technology, data management, and operational infrastructure. Ms. Nicolosi reviewed the computer hardware inventory such as approximately 1700 PCs, laptops, netbooks, tablet laptops, iPads, smart boards, 11 district servers and noted a re-allocation of resources to find more efficient ways of using computers. About 159 Smartboards have been acquired over the years mostly through Chappaqua School Foundation. Technology uses a number of virtual devices to share resources and save money in district infrastructure. She went over the current and proposed leases and noted a tremendous reduction in cost of PC's over the past year. Software usage has been diminishing because of using more web-based programs. The proposed budget is a grand total is \$2,054,803, and represents a decrease of 3.40%

Dr McKay addressed some comments and questions received over the past week regarding the staff cuts, specifically, a reduction from 3.0 to 2.4 for psychologist elementary schools, a social work reduction, due to retirement, from 1.0 to .5FTE, and a technology reduction in the middle school because of the new schedule. She discussed why these reductions were made and the more efficient use of time for the psychologists.

Pres. Kiesel made a statement about the appointment of a coach discussed last week.

"At the March 6, 2012 CCSD Board of Education meeting, a group of parents publicly stated their opposition to the recommendation and approval of the re-appointment of the varsity baseball coach. Both the administration and the Board were well versed on the issues these parents addressed.

As a matter of policy the Board and Administrators cannot and do not comment publicly on personnel matters. We take all legitimate complaints received by the District seriously. All matters of significance are carefully reviewed. Where corrective action is indicated, it is taken. While we take all complaints and accusations seriously, we also believe in the principles of fairness and due process. Know too that the overriding concern of the administration and Board is student safety and the administration and Board would take no action contrary to that concern.

We recognize that a group of student athletes were empowered to stand up and address what they perceived to be a significant problem. We hope and expect that all Chappaqua students learn to self-advocate and stand up for themselves as these students have. We similarly appreciate that parents will aggressively advocate on behalf of their children. We do expect that staff, students and community members act in an appropriate manner. While we may disagree, we respect the right to disagree and respect the individual with whom we disagree. As a community of fair and reasonable people we respect due process.

We are also a community that fosters growth. The district's guiding principal is the academic and social growth of its students. We promote growth and learning for our staff and administrators too. This community measures its members not by the challenges they face, but by how they respond to those challenges. A great deal of time and effort has been spent addressing these concerns, establishing a rigorous process and finding actionable solutions that are consistent with the principles espoused above, with consideration and respect for all involved."

President Kiesel then introduced Michael Kaufman, President of Chappaqua School Foundation.

President Kaufman thanked the board for approving the 14 grants submitted across all schools and grade levels. He was grateful of the support of the community and thanked the 24 teachers and administrators who researched and proposed all the grants. Reminder that the Spring Benefit is coming up on April 27 at the Trump National Golf Course.

President Kiesel asked Joe Gramando to begin his presentation on the Operations/Maintenance budget.

Presentations:

Operations/Maintenance - Joe Gramando, Director of Facilities

Joe Gramando, Director of Facilities presented his budget, stressing the importance of following the operating standards, the mission and goals remain the same. The five -year plan's goal is to create a healthy and safe environment and become more green. He listed some of their projects and detailed methods of training that helps control costs. Mr. Gramando explained that the Building and Grounds portion of the budget, excluding salaries. Together with Operations and Maintenance, Five Year Plan the budget has been reduced by 0.93% or \$40,000. He stressed the importance of maintenance and noted that every dollar spent on maintenance is a saving of \$4 on expense. There is a staff reduction of 1.0FTE. for 2013, and in the past five years, 8.5 positions have been cut. Jeffrey Mester and Randall Katchis congratulated Joe on the great job that he and his staff do.

Non-instructional/Fund Balance - John Chow, Asst. Superintendent for Business

John Chow presented the General Support, Transportation, Community Service, and Undistributed Expenses portions of the proposed budget. He quickly reviewed the numbers and special items. General Support includes Board expenditures, the Central Administration, the Business Office, Legal Expenses, Personnel, Public Information and special items that includes school association dues, judgements/claims, MTA payroll tax, BOCES services, etc. He expanded on Transportation to explain that although we are not changing the distance for the coming year, but we are changing the number of vans and monitors and the gas price will probably increase which represents a \$146,689 increase or 2.39%. One of the board members noted the excellent service that we receive from Chappaqua Transportation. There were a number of times where a bus driver has gone out of their way to take care of children. Mr. Chow also noted that when students miss the bus, if they are called, they will come and pick up the student. During the snow storm, Seth was out helping to cut down trees.

Mr. Chow reported that Undistributed consists of employee benefits, debt service and interfund transfers. He noted those areas where there are exclusions to the tax cap. Overall, there is a \$441,454 increase or 1.81% increase. Debt Service is a 14.01% decrease in debt service because of pay off.

Fund Balance - He reviewed the use of board approved fund balance for 2010-11 and 2011-12. He proposes to recommend an appropriate \$3MM for 2012-13 sustainability and within tax cap.

WHEREAS, Lori and Brad Wilken filed an Application for Refund and Credit of Real Property Taxes for the Year 2011-12 regarding property located in the Chappaqua Central School District, described as #92.18-2-16 on the basis that the basic STAR exemption was applied for and approved, but was omitted from the school tax bill; and

WHEREAS, the Westchester County Tax Commission has determined that the applicants were approved for the basic STAR exemption, but it was not reflected on the school tax bill and the Application for Refund of Real Property Taxes for the Year 2011-12 should be approved; and

WHEREAS, we have examined such application and the recommendation and determine that a clerical error has been made pursuant to Section 550(2)(c) of the Real Property Tax Law;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that: the Application for Refund of Real Property Taxes for the Year 2011-12 be approved, notice of approval of such application be mailed to Applicants, and the Business Official be authorized and directed to correct the assessment on the tax roll for 2011-12 to reflect the STAR exemption, thereby reducing the school taxes from \$12,793.87 to \$11,196.87, for a refund of school taxes in the amount of \$1,597.00.
